## Stir Fry Notes

Stir-fry usually refers to cooking veggies in a little oil at medium high temperatures while stirring, to keep them from burning. The taste of many veggies changes considerably the longer they are cooked; they also lose some nutritional values. One vegetable that comes to mind and which also is a favorite of mine is Asparagus. I can remember as a kid when my mom would feed us asparagus, which she had cooked in water for perhaps twenty minutes or so. I can remember it being pale green and slimy, with the bottom of the stalks being stringy. Needless to say, it was not one of our favorite foods.

When I ate in a restaurant and was served green asparagus which had been lightly cooked, I discovered a completely different vegetable than what I had known as a kid, and one that was delicious with a variety of vegetable flavors. I have had asparagus plants in my garden ever since for a long time, and as a perennial, they come up reliably every Spring and are eagerly looked forward to. The thicker stalks come from the older plants, and are the tastiest, but the narrower stalks are the most commercially viable, and so that is what usually comes to market. While I usually cook my home grown asparagus in a flat pan in just a little water for less than a minute, and then rub it with butter much as one might do with fresh ears of corn, I use the narrower store bought stalks in stir fry.



My favorite stir fry is Bird's Eye Asparagus stir fry, which I find has just the right balance of asparagus and other veggies with a smattering of fine noodles. I have tried all the frozen stir-fries, but keep returning to that one from Birds Eye, and usually stock up when there is a buy one/get one sale. It is best cooked in a non-stick skillet, as the noodles will tend to stick to a stainless pot as they become cooked. For a simple stir-fry, I add about a tablespoon of olive oil to the pan, turn the heat to med-high, add the stir-fry, toss in a pat of butter and stir until it is quickly cooked, 3-4 minutes. I then serve it with a sprinkling of grated parmesan. Sometimes I will also toss in some fresh veggies when the frozen veggies have thawed and started to cook.

For a more complex dish, I will start with sliced mushrooms sautéed in oil, to which I will then add a dozen shelled shrimp, and maybe some cooked crawfish tails (found in the frozen fish section of upscale supermarkets), before I add the Bird's Eye stir-fry. Then I will add a pack of dry Ramen or Maruchan Asian instant soup mix, along with water, no salt broth, or maybe a little wine. You only want enough liquid to moisten the noodles with a little extra on the bottom of the pan.

The thing to be cautious of here is of adding too much salt to the dish. The Ramen soup mix if you use the whole seasoning packet should be enough salt, hence the no salt broth. Water instead of broth will also help cut down on the salt. Stir and toss the ingredients until they are hot and steamy, transfer to a serving dish, squeeze half a lemon or lime over the dish and top with grated Italian 5-cheese and Parmesan.
